Introduction

The main aim of this booklet is to exemplify standards for those teaching Cambridge O Level English Language 1123, and to show how different levels of candidates' performance (high, middle and low) relate to the syllabus requirements.

In this booklet candidate responses have been chosen from the November 2020 exam series to exemplify a range of answers.

For each question, the response is annotated with a clear explanation of where and why marks were awarded or omitted. This is followed by examiner comments on how the answer could have been improved. In this way, it is possible for you to understand what candidates have done to gain their marks and what they could do to improve their answers. There is also a list of common mistakes candidates made in their answers for each question.

This document provides illustrative examples of candidate work with examiner commentary. These help teachers to assess the standard required to achieve marks beyond the guidance of the mark scheme. Therefore, in some circumstances, such as where exact answers are required, there will not be much comment.



How to use this booklet

This booklet goes through the paper one question at a time, showing you the high-, middle- and low-level response for each question. The candidate answers are set in a table. In the left-hand column are the candidate answers, and in the right-hand column are the examiner comments.



How the candidate could have improved their answer

- The candidate gave a good description throughout. However, paragraph five, which was about noon, was a little outside the requirements of the question and slightly took away from the contrast that was asked for. The result was that the description of early evening seemed brief in the penultimate paragraph. The candidate could have written less about noon and more about the early evening.
- Although the accuracy of the response was good, there were occasional errors in the use of verbs and tenses –
 see 'came' at the beginning of paragraph five and the awkward, repeated use of 'would' in paragraph three. This
 meant the response was accurate, rather than *highly* accurate.

This section explains how the candidate could have improved each answer. This helps you to interpret the standard of Cambridge exams and helps your learners to refine their exam technique.

Common mistakes candidates made in this question

- The most common mistake candidates made in the descriptive responses was that they mixed tenses. A number
 of candidates started their answer in the conventional present tense because they were asked to describe two
 contrasting times. However, as soon as they introduced some narrative involving a particular event or action, they
 changed to the past tense which was not convincing.
- Some candidates listed features instead of describing them. Even though the main senses were employed, very
 few candidates referred to the smell and feel of anything. Some candidates who chose this question ran out of
 descriptive ideas very quickly and turned the response into a narrative.

Often candidates were not awarded marks because they misread or misinterpret the questions.

Lists the common mistakes candidates made in answering each question. This will help your learners to avoid these mistakes and give them the best chance of achieving the available marks.

- **Task Fulfilment:** The candidate needed to make the particular text type, a magazine article, more obvious. They could use different sentence types (questions and exclamations) to contribute to the feeling that this was a lively text aimed in part at the candidate's peer group.
- Language: The candidate could have used more varied sentence types to add sophistication to their response. Overall, the text was accurate but there were one or two slips in verbs / tenses which needed correction. Similarly, the candidate could have addressed the omission of the definite article at times, especially in the first paragraph. An even greater frequency of more sophisticated vocabulary would have added more depth to their response.

- 1 The candidate supplies a title to the article in their own words as required in the question.

Examiner comments

- The candidate continues to use paragraphs based on the bullet points. This shows good evidence of planning.
- 11) The candidate addresses bullet point 2 well, as both strands are addressed in a specific rather than a general way.
- Vocabulary and spelling are a strength for this candidate. Words like 'beneficial', 'especially' and 'participating' lift the achievement at this level.
- 13 The candidate includes some opinion here which the paragraph helps to justify.
- The candidate demonstrates a satisfactory control of tenses throughout and the use of 'can' and 'will' here shows some sophistication.
- The candidate addresses bullet point 3 in a satisfactory way here, as they discuss the benefit of team spirit to the whole school.
- 16 The candidate's tone and register are satisfactory throughout the text.



- **Task Fulfilment:** The candidate's response could be clearer. Although all three bullet points were addressed, bullet points 1 and 3 needed specific examples to illustrate the points made, e.g. how it would help the school's reputation. The title to the piece needed to be more specific and give an indication of what the article was about.
- **Text type:** The candidate could have made it more obvious that they were writing a magazine article. They could have used questions and exclamations to make the text lively.
- Language: The candidate needed to ensure that appropriate sentence separation was used. At times it was not evident, or commas were used instead of full stops. Verbs and agreement were not always secure and so the text was *mostly* accurate rather than accurate.

Examiner comments

- The candidate mentions what students can do, so addresses the second part of bullet point 2.
- 15 The candidate uses a satisfactory tone throughout the text.
- 16 The candidate covers bullet point 3 with the emphasis on the benefits to the school.

Task Fulfilment = 9 out of 15

Language = 6 out of 15

Total mark awarded = 15 out of 30

How the candidate could have improved their answer

- Task Fulfilment: To improve their answer, the candidate needed to address all three bullet points. Bullet point 1 was omitted in this answer. The candidate also needed to show that this was a magazine article. In this answer, the title was a lift from the question rather than a title for a magazine article. In response to bullet 2, the idea of the school having to plant something was not clear. The candidate needed to make it clear whether this was vegetation or an idea.
- Language: The overall meaning of the response was never in doubt and there was the occasional accurate
 sentence, however, the candidate made frequent errors. In particular, the candidate needed to use verbs and
 tenses more accurately. The candidate needed to use more complex vocabulary and correct punctuation.

Common mistakes candidates made in this guestion

- Task Fulfilment was generally handled well, but some candidates did not respond to all of the bullet points, or in the case of bullet point 2, some candidates did not address both parts of the bullet. Some candidates did not give specific examples, e.g. in bullet 1, some candidates said that the school was eco-friendly but did not explain how. In bullet point 3, some candidates spoke only of benefits to the wider world, whereas the focus needed to be on the benefits to the school. Sometimes the bullet point responses were unbalanced, usually bullet point 1 was too long and the others did not have enough coverage. Occasionally, candidates would introduce too much narrative into this Directed Writing task, some told detailed stories of beaches being cleaned as an example for bullet point 1.
- Many candidates did not reflect the text type fully for the Task Fulfilment element. Candidates often relied simply on providing a title as required. Some candidates used an incorrect text type, usually a letter format.
- For the Language element many candidates used incorrect verbs / tenses and agreement and omitted articles. It should also be a priority to ensure that the language used is in keeping with the text type required and this is as much about formality as vocabulary.

- The candidate sensibly starts with an overall context before moving on to the specific details of the contrasting times of day.
- 2 The candidate uses some good vocabulary.

- 5 The candidate uses paragraphs well to move the focus on to one aspect of the comparison.

- The candidate needed to ensure that the verbs and tenses used throughout the description were consistent. The
 candidate started correctly with the present tense but as time shifted in the response the tenses moved between
 present and past tense in an unconvincing way.
- While vocabulary and spelling were satisfactory, the candidate needed to show more ambition in their use of vocabulary.
- The candidate relied heavily on repeated sentence types and structures and they needed to use a greater variety of these.

- 1 The candidate provides some useful detail in an extended attempt to place their description in a particular area.
- 2 The candidate uses some natural sounding expressions and the sentence separation is accurate.
- 3 The candidate correctly begins a new paragraph which allows them to move to the first half of the description.
- 4 The candidate uses a satisfactory, straightforward vocabulary so the overall meaning is clear.
- 5 The candidate uses some quite lengthy sentence structures which add a natural feel to the writing.

- The candidate needed to place less emphasis on saying what people were doing and more emphasis on using the senses to describe all aspects of the scene. They needed to ensure it read like a description; this answer felt more like a narrative at times, rather than a description.
- The candidate could have improved their answer with the correct use of tenses throughout their answer, as these were largely incorrect; this was the main weakness for the Language requirement.
- They could also have used different sentence types to add variety to their writing to improve their answer further, because this answer was based completely on statement sentences.

- The most common mistake candidates made in the descriptive responses was that they mixed tenses. A number
 of candidates started their answer in the conventional present tense because they were asked to describe two
 contrasting times. However, as soon as they introduced some narrative involving a particular event or action, they
 changed to the past tense which was not convincing.
- Some candidates listed features instead of describing them. Even though the main senses were employed, very few candidates referred to the smell and feel of anything. Some candidates who chose this question ran out of descriptive ideas very quickly and turned the response into a narrative.


- The candidate used verbs and tenses consistently and clearly in this answer. However, there were still some errors with these which meant that the response was accurate, rather than *highly* accurate.
- Sentence boundaries were secure, but there was very little use of different types of sentences and different types
 of punctuation such as question marks and semi-colons. To improve their answer, the candidate could have
 ensured variety in sentence types and punctuation used.
- They also needed to correct some of their vocabulary and spelling errors.

- The candidate uses a convincing point to strongly round off the positive side of the argument.
- The candidate's use of paragraphs shows that they have planned their argument and are moving on to consider the other side of the argument.

- The content of the candidate's work was good but there were areas in which language use could be improved, particularly as these errors were not caused by ambition. The candidate's verb usage needed to be entirely secure but there were two occasions when 'can' was used instead of 'could'. Also, agreement could have been more secure; 'many students have transport problem'.
- To improve their answer, the candidate needed to ensure better sentence separation (it was flawed in the first paragraph), ensure correct spellings and avoid the awkward change from 'we' to 'you' in the second paragraph.

How the candidate could have improved their answer

- The candidate's overall meaning was never in doubt in this answer.
- To improve their answer, the candidate needed to avoid the verb and tense errors and ensure that they used correct agreement, vocabulary and spelling.

Common mistakes candidates made in this question

- The 'Argument' question was often chosen by candidates who did not have enough ideas on the subject to sustain a full response. Some candidates found it difficult to organise their ideas and tended to jump from one aspect to another. Some candidates had ideas, but did not give convincing examples to back up what they were saying.
- A number of candidates did not have the specific vocabulary for the topic, while others used too informal a tone.

- The candidate's answer was accurate and correct, however they needed to demonstrate more ambition in their sentence variety.
- They also needed to reduce omission and spelling errors to improve it further.
- The answer consisted of statement sentences so it was very like reading a list.
- The candidate could have improved their answer by including some questions and exclamations and also an occasional short sentence for dramatic effect.
- · Most of all, the candidate could have included some speech or dialogue to add life to the writing.

- The content of this answer was relevant and intriguing and the final paragraph showed the candidate's most accurate work. However, the candidate overcomplicated their answer by writing in both the past and present tense, so the verbs and tenses used were not completely accurate. The candidate could have improved their answer if they had ensured consistency and used the correct form throughout.
- They could also have used more varied sentence structures, sentence types and dialogue too.

How the candidate could have improved their answer

- This answer was a lengthy narrative and well over the minimum number of words. The candidate could have improved the answer by writing less and checking their work for errors.
- The most obvious weakness was in the use of verbs and tenses throughout the answer. Overall, the meaning was clear enough, but fewer errors of this type could have improved the answer.
- The candidate also needed to avoid errors in the use of capital letters, agreement and the omission of articles.
- The first three paragraphs all started with 'One day', but some attempt to vary this would have improved the answer, as would some variation in the sentence types used.

Common mistakes candidates made in this question

- Many candidates found it difficult to convincingly integrate the given sentence into their narrative. Additionally, many candidates used overly long, prepared, opening paragraphs, for example describing waking up to sunlight streaming in through the window and birds chirping outside. Such opening paragraphs did very little to set the scene and delayed the action of the narrative. Candidates wrote too much in their answer, often way beyond the 500 words. They needed to spend less time writing and more time checking their work because it was rare for responses to improve after 500 words.
- For the Language requirement, common mistakes candidates made in this question tended to involve the incorrect use of verbs and tenses, the misuse of articles and the use of commas to separate sentences.
