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Introduction

The main aim of this booklet is to exemplify standards for those teaching Cambridge International AS & A Level English Language, and to show how different levels of candidates' performance (high, middle and low) relate to the syllabus requirements. This document helps teachers to assess the standards required to achieve marks beyond the guidance of the mark scheme.

In this booklet candidate responses have been chosen from the June 2024 exam series to exemplify a range of answers.

For each question, the response is annotated with examiner comments about where and why marks were awarded or omitted. This is followed by comments on how the answer could be improved. There is also a list of common mistakes and guidance for candidates for each question.

Common mistakes and guidance

(a)

- Many candidates' story openings contained very frequent errors of punctuation and grammar.
- Many candidates mixed the tenses they used in their story openings. They often jumped between the present tense and simple past tense and used the present tense instead of the simple past tense in the story opening.
- Many candidates did not structure their story openings

1b)

- I start this text by establishing a more emotionally dull and negative tone. Through pathetic fallacy "The sky shudders, a dull grey" in combination with the personification of the sky, as its "shudders" and "groans", I can attach more intense emotions to this weather and atmosphere, beyond the usual sad connotations of such stormy weather. Moreover, images such as "storm commanding its pawns of water" help the reader visualise the ferocity of this
- weather, as likening it to more militaristic images give a more intense character to it.

 However, through the rest of the passage, I build a more mysterious and tense atmosphere through the descriptions of the apartment and the sense of the unknown. After the initial setting of the weather to establish a negative atmosphere, the ambiguous one-line
- paragraph "A knocking comes from the door" creates a sense of unease that is carried throughout the passage. I start to focus on "the damp and dingy darkness", as it keeps the rest of the setting, in this case the apartment, all shrouded (figuratively and literally) in mystery. Furthermore, this ambiguity is maintained throughout the passage, especially through the character of the orange note. As the passage ends with the cryptic message "We know it all", as well as most of the passage building up to the reveal of these two cryptic notes, the tension that is built up only heightens the further sense of drama created by the notes ambiguous messages.
- Moreover, I chose to focus on the perspective of the narrator, and so through a present tense first person POV, I can highlight their perception of the situation. Through this perspective I use techniques such as similes to alludes to the sense of foreboding our narrator has. Phrases such as "taunting me like a devious devil" display the narrator's
- aggravation and potentially fear towards the orange piece of paper, whilst the image of a "devious devil" with its demonic imagery presenting this piece of paper as evil through the narrator's eyes. Moreover, this perspective allows me to use these emotions from the narrator to build a sense of tension and anticipation not only through how the narrator characterises the notes, but also himself, as the narrator describes himself as "frightened" and approaching the note "cautiously". Finally, the narrator's interactions with the notes creates a sense of fear within the reader towards the notes. With its controlling nature towards the narrator, as they find the image of this note "hypnotising", the note is shown to
 - towards the narrator, as they find the image of this note "hypnotising", the note is shown to be the more powerful character in this situation, strengthening the sense of unease in the situation. "My feet glide uncontrollably towards this beacon" and other such phrases compound the notes dominance as a character, strengthening the sense of mystery and fear.



How the candidate could improve their answer

(a)

- The candidate could have been more consistent in their use of one tense in their answer, in this case, the simple past tense.
- The candidate could have written more accurately, with fewer errors in spelling, punctuation and grammar.
- The candidate could have structured their story in clear paragraphs.

(b)

- The candidate could have consistently used a 'Point, Evidence, Explanation' format to analyse the form, structure
 and language of their story.
- The candidate could have provided clear examples of 'descriptive language' and explained why specific words are selected.

Common mistakes and guidance

(a)

- · Many candidates' story openings contained very frequent errors of punctuation and grammar.
- Many candidates mixed the tenses they used in their story openings. They often jumped between the present tense and simple past tense and used the present tense instead of the simple past tense in the story opening.
- Many candidates did not structure their story openings in clear paragraphs.
- Some candidates did not write a story opening which created drama and suspense. Quite often, the only drama in the story openings was the finding of the message.
- Some candidates wrote more than 400 words, which often meant that the story opening was less carefully crafted.
- Some candidates only wrote 150 to 250 words. While this fulfilled the requirement of being under 400 words, such
 candidates only developed their ideas in a limited manner.

(b)

- Some candidates focused heavily on the content of the story opening. They only provided minimal analysis in such cases (often only indirectly) when they outlined the structure of the piece.
- Some candidates did not comment on the specific language choices the writer made.
- Some candidates inaccurately used specific terminology or did not use it at all.
- Many candidates focused on a simple identification of the features but with little or no analysis of their effect or the ways in which they related to the audience and shaped meaning.
- Some candidates did not explore the effects of particular features of the writing in detail and did not comment on the form or structure of the text.

- today's society. And I must say that Lewis' article handles the discussion with a clear sense of understanding and expertise, accompanied by a strong and confident perspective.
- I do not wish to argue in this letter, but instead suggest some aspects of the article which could be expanded upon should the topic be covered again in this paper.
- 5 Firstly, the inconvenience of in-person shopping, in comparison to online shopping, is hardly discussed. When mentioned, Lewis brushes the idea of people preferring online shopping
- off as mere laziness. Framing it as though people who frequently shop online simply cannot be bothered to go outside and invest in a physical shop. Politely, I find this argument rather insensitive, and that it makes a string of cruel assumptions about the lives of online consumers.

Many people who prefer to shop online do it, not out of laziness, but out of convenience. To go to a physical shop, particularly if you live in a more rural area, takes money and time. More specifically, these are taken up by the cost of petrol or time spent driving. This is time and money that many people do not have between work, school, taking care of family, or taking care of oneself. Bearing that in mind, it is more understandable that people turn to online shopping; which swiftly avoids the hassle of a commute.

Alongside this, for many people, heading out to a shop is not always easy. Plenty of shoppers have disabilities (either physical or mental), which may make existing in public spaces difficult, or may make travel additionally complicated. As such, these people may find online shopping less stressful and significantly more convenient. And even for people who do not have disabilities, getting out of the house can still be easier said than done. Families for example, particularly those with small children, can struggle with keeping everyone calm and in-line during a shopping run.

- A second aspect I feel could have been expanded upon is the problem of pricing. As Lewis notes in the article, the emergence of fast fashion has led to falling prices within physical shops, but especially within online shopping. She writes of how this price disparity is part of the reason why people are turning away from in-person shops, and how prices in physical stores are now dropping to near unsustainable levels. However, I believe it would have
- benefitted Lewis' argument if the article touched on how these falling prices tend to correspond with a fall in clothing quality.
- This observation would have tremendously assisted Lewis' point of view. By discussing how clothing in online shops is cheaper, often due to its poorer quality and drastically shorter lifespan, Lewis would have provided another convincing reason for the reader to attend inperson stores. With the higher prices in physical stores, then comes a promise of quality.
- Thirdly, the discussion of our reliance on technology, and how it has even seeped into our shopping, is incredibly intriguing. However, alike these previous points, it is hardly explored, being briefly mentioned at the end of the article. I would have been exceedingly curious to hear Lewis' full thoughts on how technology has effected the way that we shop. Regardless, I do acknowlege that this conversation would have been difficult to weave into the already-extensive article. Yet, I do still wish to read Lewis' full view, perhaps in another article more specifically focused on that topic.
- Overall, despite my previous criticisms, Lewis' article remains an exceedingly convincing work. I hope that, should this topic be covered by this newspaper again, that these arguments are delved into with more detail and care.

- The candidate could have structured their review clearly in paragraphs.
- The candidate could have written a minimum of 600 words.

Common mistakes and guidance

- Candidates should understand the importance of writing in clear, properly punctuated English, with accurate sentence demarcation, to perform well in this exam.
- Candidates should ensure that they separate sentences with full stops rather than commas.
- · Candidates should generally avoid writing in sentence fragments.
- Candidates should proofread carefully, particularly for accurate sentence demarcation and for tense confusion/ inconsistency.
- Candidates should be aware of the need for clear paragraphing in their responses.
- Candidates should ensure that they write at least the stipulated minimum of 600 words.
